Introduction-(Ryrie)

- Hosea, like his contemporary, Amos, prophesied to _____ (the Northern Kingdom).
- Hosea prophesied around 732 B.C.
- By 732 B.C. Damascus had fallen to the Assyrians and by 722 _____, the capital of Israel, fell and the Jews were deported.
- Isaiah and Micah were ministering to the Southern Kingdom (Judah) during this time.
- God spoke through Hosea to proclaim imminent _____ upon Israel.

Chapters 1-3-Hosea’s Personal Life

- God told Hosea to take a **prostitute** for a wife.
- Bible scholars debate whether Hosea’s wife was a prostitute before the marriage or if she became one after the marriage. Either way, this marriage was ordained by God (1:1-2).
- The purpose of Hosea’s marriage was to illustrate Israel’s _____ toward God.
- Jezreel (Hosea 1:4) held symbolic meaning as this was the valley Jehu murdered the sons of Ahab.
- God promised to restore Jezreel in the end times (1:10-11).
- It is interesting to note the valley of Jezreel is where _____ will take place.
- God promised Jerusalem would be delivered from Assyria. However, the deliverance would not occur by Jerusalem’s own strength.

- When Sennacherib destroyed Israel, God prevented him from destroying Jerusalem.
- Gomer, Hosea's wife, pursued other lovers but was not _____.
- Gomer eventually returned to Hosea.
- Gomer's return foreshadowed Israel's ultimate return to God during the Millennium (2:7-8; 3:1-5).
- Not only will God restore Israel to their land during the Millennial, He will also cause the beasts of the field and the birds of the sky to be at _____ with Israel (2:18; see Isaiah 11:6-9).
- Hosea was to redeem his wife for fifteen shekels of silver. This was the purchase price for a slave
